"It's the most wonderful time of the year" is a beloved Christmas song by Andy Williams. Andy goes on to sing "it's the happiest season of all". The song describes all the reasons that the Christmas season is wonderful. It speaks of meetings, greetings, parties and stories. The song speaks of glowing hearts when we see our friends and loved ones. We all have family traditions and memories that are celebrated in the Christmas season. But what Andy Williams missed in his song is the actual reason for Christmas.

Luke 2:11-12 tells us "For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign unto you: You will find a babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger." NKJV Have you found the babe in the manger? Have you looked for that babe? The shepherds in the field were told of the baby that was born, but they made a conscious decision to go and find Him. "Let us go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has come to pass". Verse 16 tells us that "they came with haste and found Mary, Joseph and the Baby lying in the manger". After they found Jesus they glorified and praised God for the things that they had heard and seen. Do you praise and glorify God for your salvation, for the things that you have heard and seen?
